







scramble up an A-frame higher than the height of their handlers, walk a balance beam,

speed through tunnels and pause some time in the middle for a controlled stay—all at the direction of their handlers.

"Agility training can help build a dog's confidence, provide needed exercise and help active canines blow off steam in a constructive manner." said Jane Simmons-Moake, author of the award-winning book "Agility Training-the Fun Sport for All Dogs," and founder and training director of FlashPaws Agility Training Center in Houston. Simmons-Moake, who is the owner and trainer of the No. 1 Agility Golden Retriever in 1990, 1992 and 1993 and has several agility grand champion wins, was the agility consultant for the trial and was a member of the AKC Agility Advisory Committee.

"Almost any physically and mentally sound dog can enjoy agility," said Simmons-Moake. "It's great for dogs who have become bored with other forms of dog training, such as competitive obedience. The dogs' attitudes toward obedience work actually improve as a result of the positive working relationship created through agility training."

There are three different levels of competition: novice, open and excellent. With each level, the number and complexity of obstacles increases and the speed required to run it also increases. There are four jump height divisions for dogs of different sizes.

A perfect score is 100; a qualifying score is 85 or above, with no disqualifying faults such as displaced bars on jumps, or missing a contact zone (the area on an obstacle within which the dog must step).

What makes agility so exciting is the teamwork required between dog and handler. The course is never arranged the same way twice. At each trial, the handler must choose a unique handling strategy, custom-designed for his or her dog's skills and abilities.

the sport of dogs. For example, there were 31 conformation Champions at the first AKC agility trial, an Obedience Trial Champion, a Utility Dog Excellent, 22 Utility Dogs, 24 Companion Dog Excellents, 34 Companion Dogs, a Herding Champion, three Tracking Dogs, three Tracking Dog Excellents, four Junior Hunters, a Master Hunter and 26 Canine Good Citizen dogs.

All in all, the Houston Kennel Club did a wonderful job hosting the AKC's first licensed agility trial. "We were very happy to be able to hold the trial here," said Patricia Wilson, a member of the Houston Kennel Club and agility trial chairwoman. "A lot of people deserve a lot of credit for working hard." FlashPaws Agility Training Center supplied the equipment, stewarding staff, printed materials and organized the event. There were numerous sponsors, and each exhibitor received a commemorative T-shirt, pin, cooler, event catalog and coupons for free dog food.

"We could not have asked for a better beginning," said Bob McKowen, the AKC's vice president of performance events. "The cooperation and enthusiasm of the participants is a strong indication of the future of this event. We believe the regulations and policies are on target for what we believe people want in an AKC agility trial."





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
